## Activities

On a map of the state of Oklahoma, show the following: • The First American tribes that originally inhabited the land now called Oklahoma. • The headquarters of the 39 tribal nations in Oklahoma today.	Read two First American Origin Stories from tribal nations in Oklahoma. Compare and contrast the stories in diagram.	Learn about a First American social game still played today, such as stickball, Cherokee marbles or hand game. Watch the game played in person or online on a video.
Attend a First American event open to the public, such as a powwow or cultural festival.	Visit a museum or exhibition about First Americans in Oklahoma.	Learn about traditional dishes or meals made by tribal nations in Oklahoma.
Identify two First American artists associated with Oklahoma from 1960–present. Write a museum label describing one work of art by each.	Learn about the artforms common among First American makers, such as beading, pottery or basketry. Pick one of these artforms and identify some of the materials and techniques artists use to create them.	Drumming and singing is a major part of First American social gatherings. Listen to Round Dance songs online and create a playlist of your favorites.
Identify the ancestral lands of three First American nations removed to the state of Oklahoma.	Learn to identify five official flags of tribal nations in Oklahoma.	Learn the meaning of the symbols of the Oklahoma State Flag and the State Seal.
	Choose a tribe and learn about its government, including the name the tribe's current leader.
